# **Piraino Campership Challenge!**

Once again, thanks to **Tom Piraino and Barbara McWilliams** – and the generosity of the **Piraino Family Foundation** – we are seeking to raise \$25,000 in campership donations to match a portion of the Piraino gift. This challenge is incredibly timely now, as we have exceeded our budgeted campership funds for the 2023 summer. # SPARKS Day Camp - Registration Open!

Sparks Day Camp – located on our Torch Lake site – is enrolling campers for the 2023 summer. Sparks offers eight one-week sessions for children (boys and girls) ages 5-10. Enrollment is limited to forty children per week, with even more limited spaces for the youngest campers (ages 5-6) in our Kinder Sparks program.

Day camp is based at the Dow Building at Camp Hayo-Went-Ha – a wonderful facility that provides indoor activity space, bathrooms, refrigerated storage for lunches and more.

We have SO MUCH work to do with the physical plant at both our camps. We now have a new site master plan that will guide the process of building new facilities and renovating existing ones. We have considerable historic preservation projects to accomplish... projects that will ensure that our most treasured older buildings

remain viable. Finally, both camps have a considerable amount of deferred and preventative maintenance needs to address.

#### **Collaboration to Serve Foster Kids**

YMCA Hayo-Went-Ha Camps is entering into a collaboration with Eli's Project, a Lansing-area non-profit organization, to provide a camp experience to children within the Michigan foster care system. Eli's Project will also assist the camps in identifying mental health resources and trainings that will better support our staff in their work with campers.

Created by HWH alumnus Dr. Zach Goldstein, Eli's Project's mission is to support the mental health needs of children and teens – with a specific goal of preventing suicide within this population. It hopes to accomplish this through advocacy, education and action.

Zach's adopted son Eli, a product of foster care, attended Camp Hayo-Went-Ha and participated in the Isle Royale program in 2021. Eli passed away unexpectedly in June 2022.

Funding is currently in place to send two foster kids to our camps this summer. We also hope to secure funding to properly outfit these campers for their camp experience. In the words of Zach Goldstein:

"After years of working with HWH as the Health Officer I was able to see firsthand what positive impacts HWH Camps has on kids when I sent my son Eli for the first time. The camp experience is important for ALL kids to have. When Eli's Project was formed, we made it our mission to advocate for kids from different backgrounds or those with different life experiences. We're all excited for the potential of this joint fundraiser to represent kids who would otherwise never have the opportunity to go to camp."
