Currently, he is the Vice President of Youth Development for the Ann Arbor YMCA. He is a proven visionary and change agent toward providing high-quality camping programs for all children. He has a very strong financial development background and the ability to cultivate long-term donor relationships. He also has extensive day and overnight camp programming, management, and operational planning under his belt. Two Weeks - \$70,000 to Go!

As previously announced, our year-end campaign has set a goal of \$200,000 in total contributions. With fourteen days remaining, we must generate **an additional \$70,000** to achieve that goal. We can do it!

Brown Bridge Quiet Area to Expand!

The Brown Bridge Quiet Area – a gorgeous nature preserve located a stone's throw from Camp Arbutus Hayo-Went-Ha – is expanding by an additional 528 acres. This will increase the total BBQA acreage to over 1800.

Our AHWH campers already take advantage of the Brown Bridge Quiet Area for day hikes and trip shakedowns. The newly added property, which borders our camp to the southeast, will provide easy access to trails and recreational opportunities. Just as importantly, this means that the property adjoining ours will remain forever undeveloped.

Funding for this purchase was provided by the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund and will be supplemented by monies in the Brown Bridge Trust Fund (established using proceeds from oil discovered on the property).

Our friends at the Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy played a key role in advocating for this property acquisition. In addition to expanded recreational opportunities, the property is habitat for such wildlife as red-shouldered hawks, osprey, bald eagles, trumpeter swans and common loons.
